Where Do I Start?

Please review the <u>Next Steps for Applicants</u> resource, which contains helpful information for interested applicants. We also recommend contacting your DNR field representative for your public water system to get started. The <u>EC-SDC Grant Announcement</u> is also important to review as it provides detailed program information and requirements.

How Do I Know If I Am Eligible?

The <u>EC-SDC Grant Announcement</u> contains eligibility details. Your public water system must be an Other-Than-Municipal Community public water system or a Non-Transient Non-Community public water system. Examples include condominiums, mobile home parks, apartments and public schools. Your public water system must be small, meaning that it serves less than 10,000 individuals. Additionally, if you are a Non-Transient Non-Community public water system, you must also be classified as nonprofit, which includes school districts and government entities. Next, check your PFAS and manganese results to see if you have any of the following:

- PFOA or PFOS at 2 ng/L or greater
- PFHxS, PFNA or HFPO-DA at 5 ng/L or greater
- EPA PFAS hazard index value at 0.5 or greater
- The 2020 DHS PFAS hazard index value at 1.0 or greater
- Manganese at 300 µg/L or greater

What Is A Complete Application Package?

Applicants must submit all of the required application materials to apply for a grant. A complete application includes the following:

- EC-SDC Grant Application (Form 8700-029) with required attachments
- Environmental Review Form (Form 8700-022)
- W-9 Form
- NNs only: IRS Tax-Exempt Affirmation Letter, unless government owned

What Is An Authorized Representative?

An authorized representative listed on <u>Form 8700-029</u> refers to the public water system owner or other designated individual who is legally allowed to act on behalf of the public water system. This person will assume responsibility for all grant award obligations and federal and state requirements and signs all grant administration documents (i.e., application, grant contract, payment reimbursement materials, close-out certifications, etc.).

What Is A Point Of Contact?

The grant point of contact is the person who handles any grant application and administrative questions. This can be the same individual as the authorized representative, but often this person is the project manager or consultant working directly with DNR staff through the various grant administration processes.

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What Do I Need To Know About Federal Funds?

The federal funds for this program are from the 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). These grant awards must meet all applicable federal requirements. While federal laws may be complicated, the DNR has worked to simplify the requirements as much as possible. Please review the resources in the Next Steps for Applicants resource and work with a technical assistance provider to understand the requirements.

Where Do I Go If I Need Help Developing My Project?

Technical assistance providers are available to help applicants with project planning and assessment, project development and more. If there are any costs associated with technical assistance, consider including them in your application for potential reimbursement. Which Costs Are Reimbursable?

Your project must have the primary purpose of addressing the PFAS or manganese contamination. While expenses may need to be evaluated on a case-by-case basis, eligible activities are listed in the <u>EC-SDC Grant Announcement</u>. Reimbursable expenses may include activities related to planning and design, technical assistance, testing and research, treatment, source water, storage and water system restructuring, consolidation or creation.

How Long Does It Take To Receive An Award?

We can start processing an application once we receive all the completed application materials. Once received, reviewing and approving eligible projects can take three to six months. Please remember that if your project needs to undergo plan review, that is separate from the grant application process and can take up to three months or more in certain circumstances. Applications can only be approved for grant awards once the plan reviews are approved. For more information, please refer to the DNR's Drinking Water webpage.

What If I Do Not Exceed The Contaminant Level?

If you do not meet the contaminant levels indicated in the <u>EC-SDC Grant Announcement</u>, you do not have PFAS or manganese contamination above the threshold for funding at this time. If you do exceed the contaminant levels at a later time, please reach out to your DNR field representative to look into funding possibilities.

What If My Project Costs Are Greater Than \$240,000?

The DNR understands that projects may cost more than the maximum grant award. Currently, the DNR cannot fund over \$240,000 per public water system for this grant program. We recommend applicants get estimates for all potentially feasible PFAS or manganese options, including drilling a new well, connecting to an existing public water system and installing treatment devices.
