NR 115 Public Hearings Scheduled

The hard work of many individuals throughout the state to update the shore protection rules found in Chapter NR 115 is paying off. After five years of advisory group meetings, 8 listening sessions, 11 public hearings, and comments from over 50,000 people, the DNR has developed draft recommendations for how to update the 40-year-old rules that govern waterfront development. The DNR's goal is to better protect the healthy system of native plants and trees that are the foundation for clean water, good fishing and scenic beauty while increasing flexibility for property owners and making the rules easier to administer and enforce.

Based on the unprecedented public involvement in the rule revision process, the DNR substantially changed the draft rules it took to public hearing in summer 2005. Public hearings on the draft recommendations have been scheduled throughout the state in late July and early August. A list of the scheduled hearings can be found on Page 6. The DNR values everyone's opinions on the management of the state's natural resources and invites them to comment on the draft recommendations to amend NR 115. Comments can be submitted by either:

- testifying at any of the public hearings listed below; or

Comments will be accepted by any

means through September 7, 2007.

The public hearings will consist of two parts: a Presentation and Question & Answer session and a Public Comment Period. The first session will be from 4:30 - 5:30 p.m. and will consist of a presentation on shoreland management issues highlighting why statewide minimum development standards are needed to protect and preserve Wisconsin's water resources and the substantial private investment in shoreland properties. Attendees will receive an overview of the proposal for revising Chapter NR 115 (Shoreland Protection Program) and will be able to ask informal questions regarding the proposed revision concepts before the formal public hearing begins. Questions will not be answered during the Public Comment Period.

The Public Comment Period will be from 5:45 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. Attendees will be able to provide feedback on the proposal to revise Chapter NR 115 (Shoreland Protection Program). This will be the formal portion of the public hearing and will be administered by a hearing examiner and recorded in accordance with s. 227.18 Wis. Stats. Questions will not be answered during the Public Comment Period. Attendees will be required to fill out hearing slips in order to speak and time will be allotted accordingly.


FEMA's NFIP Technical Bulletins

Homeowners and developers can often be confused by the many requirements of the NFIP. Local officials often have difficulty either finding the time to explain the requirements or understanding the requirements themselves. One way of quickly obtaining information on a specific issue is through the use of FEMA's Technical Bulletins. The Technical Bulletins cover a wide variety of subjects from how flood resistant are various materials to elevator installation in floodprone areas.

FEMA's Technical Bulletins are designed to provide guidance concerning the building performance standards of the NFIP, which are contained in Title 44 of the U.S. Code of Federal Regulations at Section 60.3. The bulletins do not create regulation; rather, they provide specific guidance for complying with the minimum requirements of existing NFIP regulations.

It is important to note that the Technical Bulletins provide guidance regarding FEMA's minimum regulations, not the requirements of NR 116 which may be more restrictive. Also, a number of the bulletins are not applicable in Wisconsin because they relate to coastal area construction. DNR staff can assist local officials in using the Technical Bulletins.
